The sad part is his problem started Aug. 18 and it was in the hospital 12 days, home five, back once more for 12 days and home about a week and half, then back once more for

about ten days and home a few and back again until this past Tuesday.

I lost the love of my life, of 63 years, Tuesday Morning, Oct. 24. I decided to stay with him Monday evening, and I am so thankful I was close by....They had put an expandable love seat next to his bed, and I could reach between the rails and hold his hand. At this point he was on morphine, and some other medication to keep calm and pain free. The nurses were in and out pretty much of the night, and he was having some breathing problems, so about four thirty in the morning I decided to get dressed, the nurses had just left, and as I was walking toward the wash basin, when I looked at him, and he was leaving me. His heart just could not do any more.

He is at Jefferson Barracks, and as he was being driven to the ceremony area, two sailors and a marine saluted him. That made him happy. The one thing we were in a torrential rain from the time we left mass the entire procession. So we will have to go out shortly and see the exact spot he is in. My space is reserved next to him, since I was in the

Marine Corp.

Owners know that it is another one down.

While at the visitation there was a man there I did not know. He turned out to be a retired FBI agent also. After introduction, he brought out two pictures, and as I looked at the number on the ship it was 742, I looked at him and said "that is my husbands ship."

I do not know if Nick knew that, as they usually are all chatting after lunch at the retired agents luncheon. If I understood him, he was aboard at the end of Nam, and I do not know how long, but he did mention that he went to another ship. Also, he lives here in Kirkwood, so after things calm down, I will follow up. More later. I feel he did not know about Nick being aboard the same ship prior to him. I think he picked up the info from the obituary, which I had written.

I have a piece of the ship! A dummy (brass) 5"38 projectile with brass fuse, weighs about 60 lbs! We'd use the dummy round to see if what we put in the fuse setter was what the fuse was set at on the projectile. Called cutting the fuse.

You could set the fuse manually with a fuse wrench, I don't have that.

P.S. My name is on the bulkhead in Mt 51's magazine on the bottom of the sea off Cyprus where the ship lies. As just prior to giving her to the Greeks we needle-gunned the mag's and re-painted them. I did the whole forward magazine, projectile and powder room. I cut my name in her bulkhead between projectile and powder magazine.

Hope you know that all DDR's in the Navy were Frank Knox Class DDR's! As

DDR-742 was the first of the DDR's! Hence first in her class.

And that the Frank Knox only ship sunk, raised using liquid Styrofoam! Somewhere in Navy archives is a book damage control! (I've seen the book so I know it exists!!) It shows how to raise a Destroyer! and pictures of the ship on the reef and interior spaces. Plus powder & projectiles (in neat stacks on bottom of reef!!) Only Hedgehog magazine not open to sea forward of frame 110.

That is why the ship lasted so long! She had in 1965 new boilers, engine, hull. While all other Gearings had hulls built in 1940's she had a new hull from 1965-1966!
